Welcome to the first Poacher Line Newsletter of 2024!

We have had what seems like an extremely busy year and here you will find out what we have been up to, the projects our Adopters have taken part in, our projects for the coming year and much more! During 2023 we saw some great events along the Poacher line.

Skegness station, the final stop on the Poacher Line was to celebrate its 150th anniversary of its opening in the summer of 2023, a group of year 10 students from Giles Academy were commissioned to produce a piece of artwork to commemorate the station and Skegness.

The students worked together to research the history of the station and the town to produce a collaborative piece. One of the most iconic railway posters designed was to advertise day trips from London to Skegness which helped to develop Skegness as one of the most prominent resorts in the UK, the artwork has encompassed this with a nod to the Jolly Fisherman.

EMR organised an unveiling event to celebrate the work produced by the students at Skegness station. The now permanent feature showcases not only the history of the town and the Station but the individuality of the students who produced the piece. This project showed the power and benefits of collaboration with local schools and the community and the Railway station, the piece has created a focal point for the local community which will be present at the station through the wider regeneration of the station.





The concept for the Boston Station Garden area was cultivated by the Boston station adopters, a well-established group who commit their spare time to maintaining the gardens, tidying up the station, and surrounding area. The adopters earmarked a heavily overgrown area on Platform 1 that was renowned for littering and antisocial behaviour, the initiative was to create a welcoming area to bring a wealth of colour, increase wildlife presence and improve the aesthetic satisfaction to passengers passing through. The aim was to create a mini eco-system to encourage pollination from bugs and bees and create a safer area for passengers by opening up the area.

Thus, the idea was born for the 'Boston Poacher' consisting of a Train barrel planter branded in EMR livery, planted with hardy plants, bulbs, and grasses and 'Bugingham Palace' a bug hotel to encourage bugs, bees and beetles increasing pollination.

The materials from the project were sourced from small businesses and local garden centres, supporting the local economy, the project has been shared widely on social media gaining positive feedback and has improved the aesthetics of the station creating a positive, safer and more inviting area for passengers and the local community.

The project was funded by EMR and the Poacher Line.





Collaboratively Poacher Line alongside Cross Country, CRN, Robin Hood Line CRP and EMR came together to create a large-scale Mural at Nottingham station to work alongside the Railway Children charity, Base51 and ImageSkool to commission a cartoon strip to depict the journey of a young person's life. Progressing over the course of a week the artwork has attracted many of our partners to visit during its progress on the exterior wall at Nottingham station with focus on integrating one's journey through the opportunities of rail. The artwork enables the public to not only feel welcomed to the station but to also challenge people's minds into how life progresses with the influence the rail industry has on each milestone of a person's life.





To commemorate Routes of Remembrance this year, Poacher Line CRP along with EMR, Station adopters and other partnerships came together to create a poem to reflect the role the Rail industry took in supporting soldiers during the war. Workshops took place where we gathered to bring our ideas together alongside the very talented Olivia McNab who constructed the poem for us, we looked into the meaning of war, how not only soldiers but their families felt and the impact it had on the world. The poem 'It Took Every Soldier' was published on posters which appeared at every EMR station in the week before Remembrance Sunday and permanent copies have been put up at several stations, including Nottingham and Derby. A video of the poem being read by EMR staff was also made. On November 10th we gathered at Nottingham station for the unveiling and alongside EMR staff we took wreaths to remember those who had fallen.



During the ceremony, an EMR staff member read out poem as well as having a bugle player playing the last post followed by a minute's silence.

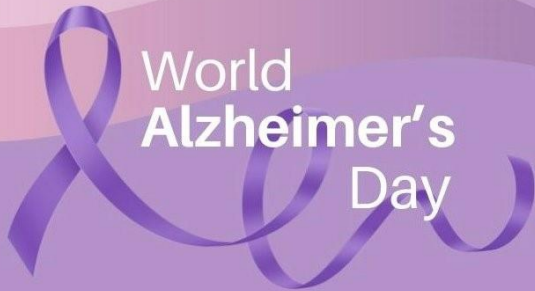

Poacher Line Media

Upcoming Projects

As we head into the new year there are many exciting projects that the Poacher Line are getting their teeth stuck into for 2024.

- We have many stations along the line where we are working on sprucing up the platforms with new planters and seasonal/annual plants aswell as larger projects where we are going to be working with Charities and schools on Rail Safety with the intention of producing some wonderful artwork to display.
- We are working towards restoring the running in board at Rauceby due to deterioration and hopefully give it a new lease of life and take it back to its original 1920's beauty.
- Boston Station redevelopment has begun as Phase 1 to convert all vacant spaces into a community café and two small start-up business spaces.
- Skegness Station renovations are also underway with Phase 1 bringing back the unused building at the front of the station being transformed into new customer areas ad new retail units.
- We have Entered and been short-listed for 'It's your Station' Silver Award in the Community Rail Network Awards for our Boston Station project.
